<b>11.00-11.45</b>	<p><b>Panel Session: Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)</b></p> <p>AMR is a health crisis that is already linked to millions of deaths worldwide. The resistance of bacteria to drugs is sometimes called ‘the silent pandemic’ which is why there is a campaign to raise awareness and keep the issue on the international agenda and to encourage action by nation states, drug companies and the general public in the fight against drug resistance. <b>11.45-12.25</b>	<p><b>Panel Session: Violence at work</b></p> <p>Every year, in England and Wales alone, approximately 350,000 workers are assaulted whilst doing their job. Many staff in healthcare work directly with the public in areas where they are likely to be at risk of attack and the impact is not just on staff but also other members of the public as well. <p><b>15.10-15.50</b></p>	<p><b>Panel Session: Women's health and the menopause</b></p> <p>Women make up 77 per cent of the 1.3 million people of the NHS workforce and research shows that 10 per cent of women leave their jobs, and many more are reducing their hours or passing up promotions, because of their menopausal symptoms. Menopause is not just a gender or age issue, as it can impact on colleagues both directly or indirectly, and it should therefore be considered as an organisational issue.
